There will be no more revelatory hearings by the House Select Committee on the January 6 Insurrection until September. We yearn to learn all the facts of the Fake President's autocratic attempt to overthrow democracy in America. But we also grow weary of it all, and are relieved to contemplate a few weeks

break from hearings about all the outrageous behavior of people we were supposed to think of as 'public servants.' As the latest COVID variant surges, more infectious than the rest, we seek some respite from the chaos of modern existence. Those senators who, out of political spite, refused to pass the bill to help our veteran soldiers exposed to all those toxic fumes from the 'burn pits" in Iraq and Afghanistan, have no respect for those who actually do serve. War is not only hell, it is a huge polluter, yet the elites who send our young to fight have no shame when they fail to pay for the human costs. Widespread public outrage soon shamed them into passing the bill. Then the FBI raided Mar a Lago!

Surfing: Communing with Nature or Dodging Trash?

When I surfed off the Southern and Central Coast of California many years ago, I could not have imagined a situation such as that pictured above. Surfing was idyllic then. Too many of those who recognize the huge scale of pollution of the oceans with mostly plastic trash, focus their efforts on cleaning up the mess—a necessary but inadequate response—without considering the need to address the *source* of the problem. Treating the symptoms does not cure the disease. We must demand the elimination of almost all single-use plastics. The same misdirection occurs in relation to carbon emissions.

Old guys like me remember the milkman delivering fresh milk directly from the local dairy to our home and collecting the empty glass bottles for re-use. We remember returning the beer bottles and Coke bottles for the deposit—they would be re-used dozens of times. We also remember selecting vegetables in the store unadorned by plastic 'clamshell' packaging. Just 5% of plastics in the US are ever recycled. Recycling processes are very water-intensive, and water is becoming a very scarce commodity. It is another failing attempt to treat the symptom instead of the disease—a Band-Aid on a compound fracture.

Books and other Sources on the New Great Transformation

Jason Hickel is a young economic anthropologist with a strong voice advocating "degrowth" of the global corporate economy. His recent book, *Less is More*, makes a powerful case for the severity of growing mass extinctions, ecological collapse, and the unsustainability of the endless-growth ideology of corporate capital. Hickel is a thought leader in the movement for replacing the neoliberal corporate economy with a *new economy* that will prioritize *human needs* over corporate profits and growth. His writing is insightful and incisive.

Climate and ecological activists I know pay attention to Hickel's work. He makes clear too, that our addiction to increased energy use, renewable or not, must be constrained, and that "green growth" is not a real thing. He perceives a cultural change coming, especially among youth. However, he does not explain *how* societies can transform themselves to create the circular human-values-based economy he advocates. Ecologists and climatologists know that degrowth is a *precondition* for stabilizing climate and restoring ecosystems. However, getting there from here will require societal transformation at a scale that is hard to grasp.

Transforming societies to operate their economies with much lower energy inputs, and none from fossil fuels is now an unavoidable necessity. Yet, it will be the most problematic of all actions to accomplish, as I explain in *HOPEFUL REALISM: A Climate Manifesto*. Nevertheless, it is a survival requirement now, a physical non-negotiable prerequisite to humans surviving and thriving on Planet Earth. neither its celebration nor the "Inflation Reduction Act" itself will reach beyond scratching the surface of the escalating climate catastrophe.
