The Hard Part: Societal Transformation... The 'environmental movement' has had a tough go from the start. The whole idea of exercising restraint is anathema to the industrial consumer culture, which was ingrained in the minds of Americans since before Thorstein Veblen labeled the burgeoning consumer culture "conspicuous consumption" at the beginning of the twentieth century. Why?

Because the so called "elephant in the room" that nobody seems able to see is that the biggest problem we have is not physical-technical, and it is far bigger than a 'problem' that our present system to solve. In fact, it is not a problem at all, it is a fundamental predicament that reaches deeply into the lives of everyone. Our fundamental predicament is that 'we' cannot 'fix' the climate emergency by any technical means alone. Eliminating fossil fuels means that almost all operations of every institution, including every business or corporation, and every level of government from local village to the federal 'deep state' (if you will), must be transformed in a way that allows society to function on a much smaller input of energy.

Unfortunately, we have relied far too long on the one energy source that is more energy dense than any of the clean renewable sources available today. We can neither ramp up the construction of new, putatively safer, nuclear power plants, nor build out the many (untested) carbon capture technologies at sufficient scale to replace current levels of energy consumption, or clean enough carbon from the atmosphere, before the entire Earth System collapses before

our eyes—which of course means that our social systems will collapse right along with their global habitat.

On top of that, the fossil fuel corporations, their industrial allies, and the complex system of think tanks, lobbying operations, and other propaganda programs, have kept the so-called "climate debate" from facing the facts by various deft distortions of language and politics. That is why the featured book, *The Language of Climate Politics*, in this issue of *The Hopeful Realist Newsletter* is so important.
