

Can a Party Become a Movement?

As the enthusiasm, energy, and joy surrounding the nascent candidacy of Kamala Harris and Tim Walz continue and even amplify, I have to ask the question that had been previously answered in the negative, if asked at all. For the nation to move beyond the conventional politics of parties and their competition for power, it must focus on the extremely urgent crises facing us. Political and economic decisions, no less cultural ones, would have to start being made on the basis of the very best evidence available on the rapidly accelerating transformation of climate, ecosystems, and even industrial-consumer political economy itself—NOT on political expediency.

Until now, the political economy of 'late capitalism' remains sacred in the culture of industrial modernism. Even the politicians who seriously reflect on the monumental predicament of climate change and its increasingly devastating consequences, continue to support 'economic growth' at any cost. The culture of NEW prevails. Now, there are some great new technologies out there, which will contribute to clean energy production and use. However, the underlying problem is too much energy use and the continued reliance on fossil-fueled energy to produce everything, including the new clean-energy technologies.

Tom Steyer was a successful tech billionaire, who gave it all up to fight for climate action. He made a failed effort to gain enough attention for a run for the presidency. I saw him interviewed on Fareed Zakaria's program GPS, last Sunday on CNN. True technophile that he is, Steyer never once mentioned the ever-growing rate of energy consumption that is driving the climate emergency; it was all about new technology as the answer to everything, without any consideration for constraint.

All the party luminaries, in their speeches at the Democratic National Convention, who mentioned economics at all, referred to the Biden-Harris stellar record of achievement in stimulating economic growth, especially in relation to coming out of the economic crisis of COVID. The infrastructure bill and the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (IRA) did a great deal to not only pull the nation out of the economic downturn resulting from COVID. It also provided some relief on the grip of Big Pharma on exorbitant drug prices, etc.

However, what will it take to begin serious actions on the most pressing predicament of all time? What will it take to cut off the extreme subsidies of the fossil-fuel corporations? Probably not a political party, however liberal on social issues and however anti-Trumpian its speeches may be. For the Democrats to overcome the cultural stagnation of industrial consumerism—and achieve the human values expressed so eloquently by Michelle Obama in what is probably the best political-convention speech ever—will require massive action completely outside the box of conventional politics.

Michelle's Mama and Me. Barak Obama, the acknowledged master of political speech, was so right when he said that he was 'stupid' to follow Michelle's speech, which I am convinced was the best ever made at a political convention. Why was it so great? Well, of course, her delivery was as close to perfect as one could imagine. She was radiant in her expression of the highest of American values.

Lately, the topic of the strength of Black women has come to the forefront in a number of ways. When Simon Biles, the strongest female gymnast ever, retorted "I love my Black Job!" in response to Trump's racist remarks at the Association of Black Journalists meeting, it reflected that same strength, as did her entire career.
