

When Serious News Is No Longer News.

Yes, the insanity of the run-up to the presidential election is worse than ever. Unfortunately, some of the most outrageous behavior, and speech, just keeps getting worse. Yet, 'Comma-La' seems able to keep her head about her and rise above the name-calling campaign of hatred to illuminate her own policy proposals and core values. The best leaders are good listeners.

Meanwhile, the growing range of news that reflects the most urgent existential threat to humanity—even perhaps more urgent (I know, hard to believe) than defeating the rise of neofascism in America—remains mostly underreported and largely unnoticed. I refer here to numerous increasingly gloomy reports on the climate/ecological emergency and the utter failure of most governments to take even the most modest actions to curb climate catastrophe. Trump never mentions climate chaos; Harris only mentions its importance in passing.

The latest report by the *New York Times*, describing the United Nations report, "Emissions Gap Report 2024: No more hot air ... please!" issued Thursday, concluded that essentially no progress had been made on carbon emissions reductions even since the Paris Accords in 2015—almost a decade ago. One might argue that ten years of intergovernmental hot air has produced no wind. Or, put differently, another decade of global institutional inaction has produced hot oceans, which produce a great deal more winds of destruction. As other 'political matters' have taken front stage, it is as if the march of climate/ecological destruction has become remarkably normalized.

Speaking of normalized destruction, as they get worse and worse, Trump's vitriol, racism, demeaning ad hominem lies, and blathering speech patterns, have been normalized, even to the extent of reporters reconstructing his ramblings to propose what they surmise might be meanings that could be attributed to his incoherent ramblings—as if he had actually said something meaningful. Is that post-factum speech writing the normalization of perverse babble?

It is something like a week before the American voters choose, or, rather, the undemocratic Electoral College chooses between inadequate representative democracy and catastrophic autocratic attempts at absolute power along the lines of the tyrants of the twentieth century, who Timothy Snyder so clearly warns us against. It could very well be less than eight years before the warnings of the world's top climate and Earth System scientists will be heeded too late, after the tipping points toward climate-ecological chaos and consequent global die-offs become irreversible.

It could very well be that both these forms of normalization of the unthinkable will be our undoing.

What are the Limits to Societal Transformation? For quite a while now, I have been contemplating what it would be like for our faltering industrial civilization to transform itself into a viable ecological civilization. As I have said elsewhere, and more than once, we have only two choices. Both are extremely perilous. In other words, the peril is there, whatever we choose to do or not do about it. But only one has a chance for a happy ending.

First, our global condition of 'rapid ruin' is well fixed into the current trajectory of humanity. That is what 'globalization' has done for us. The endless-growth global political economy, which is the endpoint of the industrial age, has brought us (those of us allowed to participate not just as wage-slaves but as full modern consumers) precisely what is taking us ever more quickly to what Ugo Bardi calls, the Seneca Effect: "rapid ruin."

Climate science, ecological science, and every branch of Earth System Science—all grounded firmly in physics, chemistry, and biology—have consistently demonstrated the singular trend

toward the collapse of each of the Earth System's subsystems, and thereby the collapse of industrial modernity itself.

That is 'controversial' only to those who refuse to apply simple logic to the rapidly accelerating changes to those systems and the inevitable implications of that large body of Earth System facts about system destabilization for the potential to retain a livable habitat for humans and other living systems.

Of course, some people think they can argue with the facts of physics—even to the extent of believing that the Democrats control the weather! Despite understanding the workings of conspiracy-theory psychology, more or less, it is nevertheless astounding to hear that some crazy folks have taken on the belief that somehow the Democrats caused hurricanes Helene and Milton to punish the people of America's Southeast region. Nobody seemed surprised that Ron DeSantis, the Republican governor of Florida considers global warming "leftwing stuff." Are hurricanes really political tools? Or, did the 'devil make them do it'?

History may not exactly repeat itself, but as someone said, it often rhymes. I would urge again anyone who has not yet read Timothy Snyder's prescient book, <u>On Tyranny: Twenty Lessons</u> <u>from the Twentieth Century</u>. Mass mania, at the hands of skilled demagogues, can be very contagious. <u>The Cult of Trump</u>, by <u>Steven Hassan</u>, helps us understand the psychopathology of cultists who are able to block out facts to retain their fantasy obedience to the 'maximal leader' and the conspiracy theories he promotes.

In some discussions with colleagues in the climate action movement—which is itself so fragmented that it has yet to muster the necessary mobilization to have much of any effect on public policy or practice—I have recently argued that we are not likely to 'move the needle' much until some form of "shock treatment" is visited upon both political-financial elites and citizenry. In my readings about people who survive catastrophic natural disasters, and disasters caused by human folly, the survivors are those who immediately, or very quickly, recognize that they are now in an entirely 'non-ordinary reality,' and that they must therefore respond to in terms not of their ordinary assumptions about the world around them. Survivors are typically those who early on realize that they must now operate on assumptions that are very different from those that drive their normal everyday behavior. Normalizing either climate chaos or Trumpist autocratic movement will take us to a very bad place where survival is less likely. We are out of time to entertain these *illusions of normalcy*.
