And the beat goes on. Meanwhile, as the Musk's marauders decimate multiple elements of the federal government, trashing people and programs alike in the false claim to be 'improving efficiency," the Dem's sit on their hands and complain... Far more deeply than many realize, this is a test of not only democratically established institutions, but of modern society itself.

The culture of indiscriminate rage and retribution would seem to have no bounds. What makes some people so vicious and mean? What makes the semi-violent takeover and destruction of legislatively authorized agencies and programs and jobs so easily tolerated? Well, of course, the right-wing Republican rhetoric on "waste, fraud, and abuse" is as prevalent as ever. All of it is aimed and taking down any operation that helps the people instead of serving the wealthy.

Some would say it's the habit of tolerating the vindictive practices and mindset that have become 'normalized' by nothing more than repetition of MAGA propaganda. Outrage that its actions might even be questioned amplifies the assertion. The mass media contribute to the chaos in their adoption of the language that is largely borrowed from the propaganda of the perpetrators themselves. By reporting on what is happening as if it were actually something normally desirable—cutting costs—the cover story frames the demolition crew as 'efficiency experts' improving government operations rather than executing the destruction we see directly. The con becomes reality rather than the illusion perpetrated by the con. The legitimation of the emergent autocracy by the mass media's corporatist language borrowed from the very purveyors of the story, lends credence to what would otherwise be dismissed as complete fabrications.

But we do not live in a world that can still be called 'normal.' In other words, the media is reporting as fact the story told by the insurrection instigator who was voted into office not to form another more effective coup, but instead to do something to make life more bearable for the average American. The voters bought into the lies. Well, as they say, 'how is that working out?" The insurrectionist in chief has now sent out privateers to plunder the wealth of the nation, such as it is.



What It Takes to Achieve an Ecological Civilization. That is a much bigger question than we might think before we try to answer it. So far, even at this late stage in the life of industrial civilization, very few have seriously contemplated what a complete answer to the question of how to realize the New Great Transformation of society that is now necessary.

Jeremy Lent is one of the few who has considered what would be involved, which includes using Nature's design principles to form ecological communities, and most importantly what must be done to get there from here.

All you have to do is consider how a modern society would have to be re-configured for it to be grounded in low energy use. Contrary to the convenient assumption of most who have even discussed it, replacing the existing fossil-fuel based high energy consumption economy with "renewable energy" sources—solar, wind, and even nuclear power generation—is nowhere near all that is required. What almost all commentators and analysts still fail to consider is the necessity to severely reduce energy consumption itself.

No matter what we do to slow the heating of the planet will require energy inputs. And, the bigger the project, the greater energy inputs required. Have you ever seen a truck on the highway hauling one of those giant wind-turbine blades? The manufacturing process to produce one consumes a lot of energy. A decade ago, I read an article analyzing the energy inputs and output of solar panels, which came to a disturbing conclusion.

The author concluded that in order for the solar panel to have a net energy gain (manufacturing, shipping, installation, etc., minus the total energy output of the panel) over the lifetime of the panel, the panel would have to be produced very near the point of its use. Now, solar panels have become more efficient since then, but the energy gain is still not all that much. I have not seen such an analysis for those giant wind farms, but the problem is much the same. Big is not better, an idea that is contrary to industrial-consumer culture.

The only reason nuclear energy production is considered "clean" is that the fission process itself does not emit carbon into the atmosphere, although it does generate a lot of heat. However, the energy that goes into the process of extracting materials, designing and building a nuclear power plant, cooling the reactors, etc., even the new supposedly safer, nuclear facilities such as the ones Bill Gates is promoting, is huge. And the problem of transporting and storing nuclear waste remains unresolved. The costs to society far outweigh the energy gain.

On top of all that, energy production itself and the waste it entails, is far from the entire problem. Each approach to the imaginary "energy transition" of mainstream environmentalism involves enormous consumption of not only energy but materials as well. The new energy optimists would have you believe that 'we' can provide energy, food, and a comfortable life for the already over-populated world by just implementing their energy-intensive energy strategy and producing just as much (now somehow 'green') consumer products as before.

Even if all their claims were true, the Earth System has a finite supply of material resources that cannot be increased. The idea of sending rocket ships to the moon to 'harvest' mineral falls into

the category of science fiction. In everyday life, confidence in oneself is a big factor in achieving success. But in an emergency, the confidence based on ordinary experience can be deadly. As I have mentioned before, numerous studies of who survives a catastrophic disaster, and who does not, demonstrate that any effective response to an emergency requires dropping your ordinary assumptions and dealing directly with the parameters at hand.

What it takes to achieve an ecological civilization is way "outside the box" of ordinary thinking. We are in a new reality in which the reorganization of society is necessary for us to operate on far less energy and materials than what is over-consumed today. Because of the very extractive nature of the current global political economy—driven by the imperative of capital accumulation—that very same political economy must be transformed or replaced in order to achieve anything close to an economy that operates in harmony with the ecosystems upon which we will always depend.

We humans are part of Nature, despite the imaginary framing of our existence as separate and in control of it all. That fiction has been pervasive in the culture of industrial modernity since before the industrial revolution. It remains a fiction and can no longer be treated as reality. We have already passed the capacity of the Earth System to carry the load of our extremely excessive over-production, over-consumption and over-waste. Our only viable option now is to constrain the consumption of energy and materials to a level not seen since before the industrial revolution. Once recognized, that will be the greatest culture shock humanity has ever experienced.

The discomfort such a New Great Transformation will entail is no greater than the shock of trying to figure out how to transform the political economy of waste into a frugal society brought into harmony with Nature. Just look around you. Think about the flow of energy and materials that are necessary to sustain society as it is. That system is impossible to sustain, even as those who tout what they are doing as "sustainable" this or that. To overcome this predicament will require completely restructuring the way society operates.

The good news is that the vast technical knowledge that we possess can be applied to creating new low energy and materials consumption economies using some very old and some new low-energy tools to sustain an economy that uses far less materials and energy than we are used to. The bad news is that we have so far to go to 'change the mindset' of those who cling to the industrial-consumer culture, despite its necessity.

What would an ecological civilization look like? Well, I Googled "images of an ecological civilization." The image below is typical of what I found, which reflects the imaginary concept from the perspective of our industrial-consumer civilization. Most such images include 'futuristic' high-rise buildings with solar panels and/or wind turbines interspersed with lots of greenery and often a high-speed rail liner passing through. What's wrong with that?

All the superficial elements of an 'industrial-modernist' vision of a 'green' future are prominently displayed. Look more closely and you will see that it makes little sense, operationally. It does not represent a complex living human system, just some elements thrown together. The problem with Al is that it lacks human intelligence, which as neuroscience, anthropology, and complex systems science demonstrate, involves complex interactional elements. This image indicates none of the complexity of human life, just a bunch of components stuck together—a reflection of the failure of linear thinking in a non-linear world. Radical culture change is necessary for survival.

Books and other Sources Related to the New Great Transformation

Most of us have a hard time imagining the fall modern civilization, unless it is a Hollywood fantasy ginned up by an unlikely event such as an asteroid plummeting toward Earth, or aliens invading from outer space, calling upon our hero to overcome the threat. We have trouble envisioning our stable modern society, if not our own life, doing anything but continue on. We do seem to be able to imagine all manner of conspiracies from dark political forces we can't quite identify. But what about the collapse of our social order due to the untenable situation it has put itself in? Self-justifying propaganda by power elites certainly plays a big part, but there is more.

John Jost, A Theory of System Justification, Harvard University Press, 2020.

John Jost explains why so often people will defend a social system that causes injustice, destruction, and misery, even their own suffering. People often defend the status quo because doing so gives them the security of being certain that things are much more stable than they may actually be. Also, seeking social acceptance leads people to not buck the 'conventional wisdom' that assures them that 'there is nothing to see here,' or 'we have this under control,' when in fact nothing could be further from reality. That is a very big factor in the increasingly hierarchical systems of authority today, resulting in very high levels of stress and anxiety. Hence, the proliferation of conspiracy theories and political extremism, allowing the false certainties they entail.
