What Nature Does.

Ruth DeFries, is an evolutionary ecologist and a recipient of the MacArthur "Genius Award." She wrote a book called *What Would Nature Do? A Guide for Our Uncertain Times*. Not only is DeFries an eloquent writer, what she writes is extremely important for our human future. (I'm pretty sure I recommended this book in my *Books and Other Sources*…" section a year or so ago.) She argues that humans have gotten off the track of what life is all about, and that there are vast numbers of examples in Nature of the approach we ought to be taking in forging ahead.

By redirecting societies away from the disastrous terminal path we are on, and taking a bunch of hints from the complex adaptive systems that compose the natural world, we could build ecological societies grounded in the goal of enhancing the wellbeing of human groups and all the other species that make up the whole Earth System—which some call *Gaia*.

I often wonder how long it will take and how many and how severe the catastrophic reactions of Nature to the destructive effects of the complex global political economy of endless growth must be, before we wake up to the fact that the only "fix" to the mess we have created. We need a total transformation of the global political economy, which the global elites built without a thought as to its fundamental incompatibility with the Natural Systems it plunders, and upon which we all depend for our lives.

The extreme flooding especially in Texas this past few days, shocked so many people because so-called "natural disasters" have always fallen within a certain range of danger and destruction. But that is primarily because we still operate within the language of human control over Nature. (See Robert Cauneau's quote here below today.) We are the proverbial fish in linguistic water. We all grew up by learning the language of industrial modernism, wherein little room is allowed for understandings of Nature with us within it instead of over it. We are not "stewards" of Nature, nor should we ever have been. We are *part* of Nature, whether we recognize it or not.

What Nature does is operate as it always has on planet Earth. In particular, living systems in Nature are complex adaptive systems; they are physical-chemical-biological-ecological facts. Each operates and exists within a larger complex system of such systems, having gradually over

millennia evolved and adapted to each other as mutual environments that constitute the conditions necessary for each other's existence.

Mutuality, harmony, and complementary opposites constitute the essence of living systems. Each human, for example has within it more living critters other than itself, than the number of cells that are itself. We are us in a far more inclusive way than almost anyone but someone like Ruth DeFries understands.


Many humans have a basic sense of our interdependence with one another, and perhaps a lesser sense of our interdependence with other living systems. But, despite the dominator cultures of the extractive political economies in which we live, we also know deep down that we are part of the natural world, not just when we go to visit in a national park on our vacations. We stand in wonder, yet we do not make the mental connection with our daily consciousness, since that is dominated by the frameworks of language in which we live on the job or in the shopping mall, suburb, or city.

In the words of the 1960s, we have a lot of 'consciousness raising' to do in order to visualize the actions we need to take collectively, actions that are quite contrary to the interests of the so-called "one percent." Nevertheless, despite the intellectual and emotional relativism of modernity, you just cannot mess with Mother Nature for long without paying the price in floods, drought, extreme storms or unlivable heat, crop failures, and ultimately societal chaos and collapse. There is only one alternative: A New Great Transformation of human societies in line with the necessities of shaping an ecological civilization truly integrated with Nature.

LOOK UP! A Bi-weekly Featured Commentary

David Suzuki is Right, ...and Wrong.

It is the same old dilemma that has plagued the evolution of the climate crisis from early on. We know that all the best data and climate models portend great loss and suffering for humans and almost all other species as temperatures and climate chaos reach intolerable levels. If we have paid attention to the vast accumulation of scientific evidence, we know that massive reduction in the destruction caused by industrial modernity is necessary to avoid societal collapse amid the breakdown of the stability of the entire Earth System.

But when we hear David Suzuki, one of the world's most respected environmental scientists say that it is too late, we are taken aback. He is not the first to say that we cannot stop the juggernaut of climate chaos and all the positive feedback loops that have the effect of accelerating the destabilization of the Earth System more and more as we move deeper into the unknown. After all, we have not even been able to slow the growth of carbon emissions in the decades that nations have talked about commitments to do so. But Suzuki has been an important leader in shaping a viable human response.

Some politicians proclaim policy motives strictly as a means to power. They care little or not at all about the policy motive itself; it is strictly a narrative means to the end of gaining power. If we are to act rationally in responding to politicians, we must be on the lookout for true motives behind the veil of presentation.

But, for the most part we do not recognize the speech of politicians as performative instead of informative. Do they inform us about their values, beliefs, and intentions? Not so much. Oh, some do of course. Jamie Raskin comes to mind. He is also a constitutional scholar and explains the importance of constitutional principles for our daily lives and for how the Constitution is meant to constrain the worst impulses of politicians.

Some research has shown that among the most successful politicians and corporate executives, a greater proportion have narcissistic and sociopathic personalities than are found in the general population. Why? I suspect that is because climbing the corporate or political ladder is aided by having excessive motivation and skills in social-psychological manipulation, which are common traits of narcissists and sociopaths (BTW, the terms, sociopath and psychopath, have virtually identical meanings as used by psychologists and sociologists.)

Of course, 'manipulation' is a behavior found almost everywhere among humans. It is not all bad; we have to assert some level of control over one another in order to coordinate our behavior to make the social world work for ourselves and others. When we say that a person is 'manipulative,' we usually mean that the subject of the statement is someone who has an inordinate tendency to try to control other people over and above the normal acts of control and coordination, which are more a matter of negotiation.

But, in politics it is not just about individual behavior and pathological aspects of political performance. In other words, the pathology of Donald Trump is not just about the guy I just cannot resist calling the Fake President. (If the role of president is seen by its incumbent as strictly a means to his personal power seeking and has no sense of its obligation to uphold and defend the Constitution, then that incumbent must be a 'Fake President—that's how I define it, anyway.)

The thing is, politics and political movements are not just about their leader, however, charismatic or politically powerful he or she might be. The MAGA movement, for example, is driven by an imaginary political worldview with specific theoretical anti-historical idealizations about what America was, is, and ought to be—white men dominating the world. That is why they want to ban books that refer to the realities of slavery in our history and deny discussion or even images of things and people they find offensive.

Extremist political movements that try to control the narrative to exclude any fact that contradicts its ideological premise, are inherently authoritarian and thereby anti-democratic, and opposed to every foundational principle of the Constitution. But a constitution survives only by its lived practice. We used to rely on the fact that despite occasional violations, most politicians stayed within the borders of basic constitutional principles, which thereby upheld the constitution.

Today, we have too many politicians who have accepted the idea that we don't really need the Constitution in order to follow the authoritarian hierarchy they think would be more 'efficient.' Efficient at doing what? Overthrowing the rights of citizens and everyone else in order to force the adoption of their self-serving ideology of power.

So, in the sociological sense, David Suzuki may be even more right than in the biological sense. The current trend toward completion of the autocratic attempt to abandon democracy for a

new brand of fascism may be an even greater reason for Dr. Suzuki to feel that it is too late. The regime is already slowing down our miniscule progress in mounting serious climate and ecological action so much that whatever the political outcome, our ability to 'catch up' to the level of being far behind will be extremely abridged until and unless the current coup is curtailed.

Rebecca Solnit is far too creative to indulge such self-indulgence. That is why she has such wonderful insights. The world is far too complex to be so certain about the future. Solnit's stance, and her creativity are all about possibility, which is far more important than being certain about what nobody can really predict.

Quotable Quotes

I usually offer up a very short quote, two or three lines or so. But this statement, quoted in a Facebook post by Erin Remblance, the insightful Australian climate and economic thinker and human wellbeing advocate, is actually very short for what it conveys. (Erin always has valuable things to say.) This quote is packed very tight with some of the most important elements of the greatest human predicament to arise in any society in history. Read the whole powerful essay on reality, evidence, and language, here. The role of constrictive language in misunderstanding modern reality is crucial.

No reform, no alternative project, no emancipatory policy has any chance of success until individuals become aware of the fact that they are, first and foremost, locked into an imposed language and imagination. The first act of any real transformation as an act of disclosure: making each person realize that they think in terms of words and categories they have not chosen but that have chosen them. It is not brute force that holds us back: it is a manufactured consent, an invisible manipulation, that of the narratives and frameworks we internalize without questioning them. Until this act of conscience takes place, any change remains wishful thinking.
